## TAMMANY COPS ATTACKS ONSC

Police terror was unleashed against the Scofttsboro mass defense Wednesday afternoon when cops broke up a Scottsboro protest meeting at 133 rd St and Lenox Ave. They started a near riot.

Six people were beaten up and arrested, including Charles Alexander, Negro leader of the Communist Party: Elizabeth Laffer, Negro worker; Dlaz, a Spanish worker; and three other people whose names were not obtained.
