Dear Sheila:

I'm taking advantage of the presence here of a young English Marrist-Humanist(actually an Australian). Andy to send you a copy, hot off the press, of. finally. my new work. Hoss Luxemburg, Women's Liberation, and Mark's Philosophy of Revolution since the British (Harvaster) publication will not come off the press till Feb. 1983 minus and then only in hardcover with a terrible price.

Despite your greater interest in Women's Liberation as "an organising iden" than in what I keep stressing as a philosophy of revolution in Marn's Marxism (Marx's, not inspire Origin of the Family). I do hope you will want to review my work. It isn't a question whether one is "for" or "inguinst" my views that concerns me so much as my total opposition to women unconsciously participating in making me an unperson even as not only the capitalists in the Stalibists and Trotskyists have done, lo, these many years. What always excites me is a battle of ideas and it is your initiation of such battle of ideas regarding my work that I'm appealing for, in England. Are you willing?

After all, whether or not you attribute as great importance as I do to part 3 of the work on Marx's philosophy of revolution, the unexplored women's dimension in Luxesburg—and that from the moment whe came to Germany at the turn of the century and denied that she was "interested" in WL. Esing, instead interested in the fact that ever since the 1895—Japaneze-Chinese War there was a new global division of power i.e., the min first whiff of imperializm. Nevertheless, having obtained the editorahip of one of the S-D papers, whe at once remised that, as women, editorship didn't mean she would get the privileges that job signified for men. Or, feeling suddenly in the great 1905-of Russian Revolution in Poland that she mione domanded "full social, economic, political equality for men" then and, though her lover, Jogishes, agreed with her on that, he didn't quite mean the same thing regarding relationship of spontaneity to organization.

Instead, all those tensions led to the separation of the two and her being able to say, in 1907, "I am I only since I broke with Jogishes." Why didn't writers, blographers, disclose all the dimensions in her at once and at one, even though she hadn't made it easy for them to discover since she, too, was "leaving it" to Clara Zetkin as her procedupation? In that respect Todav's Women's Liberation did compel new probings beyond what Ross Luxesburg thought as women's domain while remaining an "original" and living a very different life then, even as revolutionary, was "somen's domain, that are explored for the first time in my work, within the context of "revolution in permanence" and tottal uprocting of the old, including old Marx-ist. but not new M-H-ist. Don't you think it deserves discussion even if it means the end of me as unperson?

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
