

The following abstract is for ROSA LUXEMBURG, WOMEN'S LIBERATION,
AND MARX'S PHILOSOPHY OF REVOLUTION (New Jersey and Sussex:
Humanities Press and Harvester Press, 1982)

This comprehensive study of Marx's Marxism is rooted in Marx's works as a totality, now that his heretofore unpublished Ethnological Manuscripts are available. The author finds in Marx's final writings a "call to the 1980s" on the questions of both women's liberation and the "Third World," as well as in his projection that revolution could come in backward countries ahead of the advanced West. The previously unprobed feminist dimension of the Marxist revolutionary theory, Rosa Luxemburg, is here revealed on the basis of the new Manuscripts of Marx's last decade. The work challenges the interpretations of all post-Marx Marxists, beginning with Engels, by following Marx's development of a philosophy of "revolution en permanence", on the basis of the dialectical principle of the transformation of reality.
