I was permitted to be a momber of the Master Tabler Congress (you listed it wrongly as the National Negro Congress) because that was the period when the labor movement in this country was so backward as not to permit any washilled workers, and we were out to break down the AFT's maximum even if it meant we had to organize Negro unions. The word "labor" was the way some whites were permitted to be members; indeed at the beginning, it looked as if I was the token.

JOHN HAYNE HOLMES, CHAPLES EDWARD RUSSELL, ROSE PASTOR STOKES, WILLIAM L. FOSTER DOROTHY DAY, MERIDEL LESUEUR, MAX EASTMAN, CRYSTAL EASTMAN and other great leaders of socialism in the United States, However, I never heard of you, my dear, until dear Mr. DENBY answered my letter to him with your assistance on some of the historical questions.
