# Stop Use of Convict Labour in Industry



IOHANNESBURG—A call to the entire trade union movement to protest against the use of convict labour in industry was made last week by the S.A. Congress of Trade Unions. Convicts are being used by employers in the timber and preserved fruit industries on the East Rand, and in Benoni particularly, says SACTU.

Convicts can be seen at work any day of the week at Benoni's Colonial Timbers and in the timber yard of M. Seligman, at Dunswart, Benoni; also at the Langeberg Koöperasie Beperk.

While there is unemployment among Non-European workers on the East Rand and African workers are restricted by the Urban Areas Act from obtaining work in any town but the one in which they reside, the Government is using convict labour for the benefit of private employers and to undercut the way standards of free labour. In some factories employers are coming to rely permanently on convicts.

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## SPLIT IN LIBERAL **PARTY**

### Mrs. Ballinger, Dr. Friedman To Lead New Party?

CAPE TOWN.—'The resignation of Mrs. Margaret Ballinger, 'for personal reasons," brings out into the open a conflict which threatens to split the Liberal Party from top to bottom and lead to the formation of a new party.

There has long ben disagreement between the "conservative" Liberals, headed by Mrs. Ballinger, and the "liberal" Liberals, who are mostly members of the Johannesburg branch of the party.

Mrs. Ballinger has been angling to capture the support of the "left-wing" members of the United Party, and eventually to lead a sort of Liberal opposition in Parliament. The "liberal". Liberals have been dissatisfied with Mrs. Ballinger's leadership, as they feel she has concentrated on her Parliamentary ambitions to the exclusion of all other forms of political activity.

PRIVATE TALKS

Private talks have already been held in Johannesburg and Cape Town in order to discuss the possi-bility of a new political party.

Some of the initiative has come from Dr. Bernard Friedman, who is from Dr. Bernard Friedman, wno is trying to escape political extinction. During his Hillbrow campaign Dr. Friedman declared that he would not join the Liberal Party. He aims to join with the conservative-Liber-rals, who dominate the Cape Town branch of the party, and others

who have left the Unitey Party, in

who have left the Unitey Party, in forming a new party.
This new party would not be as liberal as the Liberal Party nor quite as corbervative as the United Party, It would hope to cash in on the present discontent with the U.P. on the part of some people for whom the Liberal Party is too "left," and the Labour Party not respectable enough either.

#### NO SUPPORT

The funny side of these manoeuvres lies in the fact that the new party (if it is ever born) would be a committee of leaders in search of a few followers. Dr. Friedman's active workers in the Hillbrow campain were mainly the liberal. Liberals of the Rand plus a few Labour Party people. Without them he would not have polled 1,000



# FOR A NEW S. AFRICA

THE Administratór of the Transvaal, Dr. W. Nicol, opening a new Afrikaans high school recently, said the opening of every new school "further entrenched the maintenance of Western civilisation."

"Western civilisation," said the Administrator, who is a Nationalist, "meant human rights, democratic rights, freedom to think and speak, religious freedom, language rights, ethical social life, the rights of the individual and the opportunities for his advancement through his own efforts. For the maintenance of these ways of living and thinking we must always be on our

Against whom? Reading Dr. Nicol's remarks, and thinking about South African realities, one can only conclude: against the Non-Europeans. Dr. Nicol evidently had in mind the "danger" that the Non-Europeans in South Africa are demanding a share of the Western civilisation, which he wants to preserve "for Europeans only."

It is perhaps ridiculous to take Dr. Nicol seriously. How is it possible, one may ask, for Dr. Nicol to boast of "human rights, democratic rights, freedom to think and speak," with the Suppression of Communism Act on the statute book, and police raids becoming ever more frequent? With newspapers banned, and the threat of censorship in the air?

How can a man speak of the value of "ethical social life" when the Nationalist Government, using its powers under the Urban Areas Act, is tearing wives from their husbands, mothers from their children, making a mockery of family life?

Dr. Nicol claims to stand for the right of the individual to have "opportunities for his advancement through his own efforts." Yet Non-Europeans are denied those rights by law, and between them, Verwoerd and De Klerk intend to ensure that the few avenues of advancement at present open to Non-Europeans are closed to them.

But let it not be thought that Dr. Nicol is just a fool or a hypocrite, or even merely colour blind (it is difficult to find words to describe his condition). For not even white South Africans today enjoy the rights which he is urging them to

Last week, with the election of a new Senate, in which they have an automatic and overwhelming majority, the Nationalists exposed parliamentary democracy in South Africa for the fraud that it is

It was not enough that the vast bulk of Non-Europeans had no vote anyway. It was not enough that the loading of constituencies in favour of the platteland meant that the vote of the city-dweller was worth only half that of the countryman-which was what brought the Nats to power in the first place in 1948. It was not enough that the Nats gave themselves six seats for jam by providing representation for the whites of South West Africa (12,000 voters in the Cape Town urban constituency of Sea Point have one M.P.; practically the same number of voters in South West get six! And all Nationalists!)

As if that were not enough twisting of "democracy," the Nats have added to it the new Senate, which at last gives them their two-thirds majority to disfranchise the Coloured voters, and also to change the constitution to their hearts' content before the next election.

In truth, Dr. Nicol's Nationalist Party is not only afraid of the Non-Europeans, it is also afraid of all white men and women who are not Nationalists. Today, the United Party, the Liberals, and all other white non-Nationalists have been placed in the same position as the Non-Europeans in the sense that they no longer have any hope of defeating the Nationalists through the ballot box.

Who then is left to enjoy the rights of which Dr. Nicol boasts? The answer is: No one. There is no Western civilisation in South Africa, no democratic rights, no freedom to think and speak, no ethical social life, no individual liberty. All these are myths. Dr. Nicol may believe in them, but then he is used to proclaiming his belief in things which cannot be scientifically demonstrated as true.

The real truth about South Africa is that a ruthless clique of race-mad politicians have won power for themselves and are determined to hang on to it to the very end. They will defend it with bullets. They will defend it with lies about democracy and Western civilisation.

### THE SOVIET BOMB TEST

THE Soviet Union announced last Saturday that she had exploded a hydrogen bomb bigger than that set off by the Americans in their test in the Pacific ocean last year.

It must have been with very great reluctance indeed that the Soviet leaders took the decision authorising the explosion. They did so only after every effort at Geneva—and before—to make such a deci-sion unnecessary had failed.

The Soviet Union has always stood firmly for the outlawing of the use of atomic and hydrogen wea-pons and for the destruction of all existing stocks of



On February 18 this year. for example, when the Wes-tern powers were making plans for equipping Western plans for equipping western Germany with an atomic army, the Soviet Union issued an appeal to all the world

powers in these words:

IMPORTANT STEP

"The Soviet Government considers atomic weapons

should be banned and effecttive international control established for the prohibition of atomic weapons and the reduction of arms and armed forces, first of all those of the major powers.

"An important step in that direction would be

an international agreement under which the states would make a solemn pledge to refrain from using

The plan suggested was an agreement:

"1. To abolish completely the stocks of atomic and hydrogen bombs which states possess, leading to exclusive utilization of atomic material for peaceful purposes.

"2. Not to increase the size of their armed forces and their armaments as compared with the level of January, 1055, as well as not to increase alloca-

At first the Western renly to this proposal was to pretend that it was a Soviet trick. They claimed that the U.S.S.R. had a huge army ready to march on

Europe and that the only thing stopping them was the Western "superiority" in atomic weapons. The Soviet proposal for a ban on atomic bombs was just a way of placing the West at the mercy of the U.S.S.R.

#### THEIR PLAN

They put forward a scheme to limit the size of the armies of the capitalist and socialist world to roughly the same strength—about three million

To the utter dismay of the West, six weeks later, on May 10, the Soviet Union announced that it accepted the Western plan. And as a proof of good faith, without waiting for a similar move from the West, it reduced its army by 640,000 men.

SINCE MAY 10 THE SOVIET UNION HAS BEEN BATTLING TO GET THE WEST TO AGREE TO—OR EVEN COMMENT ON—A PROPOSAL THAT HAD ORIGINALLY COME FROM THE WEST ITSELF.

### AGAIN AT GENEVA

This proposal was put forward again at the Geneva conference. In spite of the fact that the United States had performed its own experimental explosion of the hydrogen bomb, while the Soviet Union had not done so the Soviet Union urged too that all tests be stopped. By making this proposal that all tests be stopped. By making this proposal the Souter Union was agreeing to place itself at a disadvantage by foregoing the knowledge which it would obtain from experiments with the hydrogen bomb—knowledge which was in the possession of the Americans.

### REJECTED BY U.S.

But the United States rejected the Soviet proposal.

They saw it as a sign of weakness, interpreted it as meaning that the Soviet Union could not develop a H-bomb. In accordance with the U.S. policy of "negotiation from strength," the Americans announced that they would continue their H-bomb

With the blessing of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Britain too announced that she was going to develop a H-bomb. And at the Geneva conference Eisenhower put forward his famous counterproposal which the Wes

has since used so strenuously in order to sidetrack Eisenhower said that before there could be talk of actual abolition of nuclear weapons there had to be a control system to ensure that the agreement was kept. He proposed an agreement for aerial inspec-tion of U.S. and Soviet territory.

While not rejecting the Eisenhower plan, the Soviet leaders pointed out that it was not enough. Both the United States and the Soviet Union are very big countries," said Prime Minister Bulganin in a report to the Soviet Parliament. "One could hide anything in them if one wanted to!"

#### LAST RESORT

But those in the West who fear disarmament seized on the "control—not disarmament" cry

And after an immense wave of anti-disarmament propa-ganda, led by Dulles and echoed by the Western mili-tary leaders, they succeeded in deadlocking the Geneva Foreign Ministers' conference, in-sisting on a detailed scheme of "inspection of existing stocks and production plants" before agreeing to the actual destrucagreeing to the action of weapons.



#### COMPROMISE PLAN

The Soviet Union therefore put forward a compromise plan—simultaneous agreements for inspec-tion and for the destruction of all nuclear weapons but this, of course, is the last thing the war-maker

The United States policy of "negotiation from strength" and of "massive retaliation" can only have meaning if its supporters can convince the people of the Western world that the United States is indeed much stronger than the Soviet Union, and that it has nuclear weapons which could paralyse the socialist world without any fear that America itself would be destroyed in retaliation.

After her every move to obtain agreement for the destruction of all nuclear weapons had failed at Geneva the Soviet Union issued its announcement Government is pushing ahead with Government is pushi

Moscow radio stated that the Soviet Union had carried out a hydrogen bomb test of a new type, bigger than the one conducted by the United States bigger than the one conducted by the United States in the Pacific last year. The result—"the most powerful of all explosions up to now." As a safety measure the test had been carried out at a very great height.

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### INDIA TOUR

At the time of the announcement, the Soviet Prime Minister, Mr. Bulganin, and Communist Party secretary Mr. Kruschev, were on a triumphal tour of India.

Speaking at a huge mass meeting in Delhi some day before, Mr. Bulganin (called Pandit Bulganin— 'philosopher' Bulganin—by the cheering crowds who greet him) had given the Soviet view of the



"We shall always try to attain the prohibition of atomic and hydrogen weapons, the reduction of conventional armaments, the creation of a system of collective security in Europe, and the universal widening of contacts between governments."

### NEVER BE FIRST

"The Soviet Union will never be first to use the atomic bomb," Mr. Kruschov told the Indian people. But the new explosion "would tell people it is im-possible to start a new war because if anyone starts a war he will receive the proper answer.

Soviet policy is clear, and her hydrogen bomb test soviet poincy is clear, and ner hydrogen bomb test makes it even clearer. She will do everything in her power to achieve the banning of nuclear weapons. But this not because she wants neace. This is the map published in Die Burger last week showing the Government's long-term plan for a "giant residential area" for Non-Europeans in the Cape Peninsula. Hundreds of thousands of Non-Euro-peans — Coloureds, Africans, Indians and Malays—will one day, according to Die Burger, live on the sandy wastes of the Cape Flats. In their new ghetto the Non-Europeans will be far from the centre of the city, far from all the amenities which have been developed over hundreds of years, far from their place of work, far from the sea. Their transport costs and the time it takes to travel to and fro will be greatly increased—all in the in-terests of maintaining white supremacy. Note that, typical of its racialist approach, Die Burger refers to the new King David Club as the "Jewish Club" (Joodse Klub). This club and the new Cape Town airport are on the fringes of the proposed Non-White area.

The United Party is being applauded-and quite rightly- for walking out of the farcical Senate elections in Pretoria. should have never walked in.

The Labour Party and even the Bekker party boycotted the proceedings. But Strauss took his party along as part of his cam-paign to avoid a final break with Nationalists.

The Nationalists were so un-compromising, however, that even the United Party could not take it. It had to leave.

#### POLITICAL CRISIS

The Senate elections are part of the crisis of our times. If a date has to be fixed for the emergence of dictatorship in South Africa, it might be said: the Sen-ate Act, 1955. But the United Party must bear its share of the crisis.

Its persistent betraval of prin-

ciples and its increasing surren-der to Nationalism has helped to create the situation which exists to-day. It must shoulder part of the blame for the growth of Nationalist dictatorshi

The United Party walk-out was marred by two factors: one, the initial walk-in; two, the fact that the party was prepared to nomi-nate candidates for the new Sen-ate. The elections in the Cape put the situation in better per-spective. All that happened there was that Sir de Villiers Graff had a minor quarrel with the chairman and delivered a speech.

Conradie's name on the list of nominated Senators, tried to nominate Mr. Conradie again so as secure an opportunity to speak in support of his nomination. The chairman, Dr. W. Nicol, Administrator of the Transvaal, rejected the second nomination and also

the second nomination and also refused to allow speeches.

Strauss correctly described the Nationalists' behaviour as "a remarkable revelation of their attitude." They were openly impatient. They had not gone all the way to Pretoria to vote democratically and painstakingly; they were there to put their men in the Senate and get it over and done with.

All the newspaper reports have described the proceedings as one long uproar. The chairman would not budge an inch, and the Nationalists indulged in their usual game of shouting "shut up" and "sit down." Even when it became obvious that the proceedings were heading for a breakdown, the Nationalists would not budge.

WHO PAVED THE WAY It is all very well for the "Rand Daily Mail" to declare that the Senate Act makes "every

promise, every assurance, utterly meaningless." It is all very well for Strauss to declare that the establishment of a one-party

State.' State."

The African Music Society has been showing in Johannesburg an exhibition of African paintings and drawings from the Potopoto Group of Brazzaville in French Equatorial Africa; the Romain Desfosses and Moonens Groups of Elizabethville in the Belgian Congo; street painting from Leopoldville; the Cyrene Mission School Painters in Bulawayo; and the Polly street Group and Indaleni Arts and Crafts school from our own country. The exhibition of African paint-ings staged by the African Music Society at the Johannesburg Pub-lic Library has been of manifold interest. I feel that it is a fallacy interest. very clearly the happy influences from the various environments— the Brazzaville and Elizabethville the Brazzaville and Elizabethville Studios to name but two; and the unfortunate lowering of the standard at Cyrene owing to the absence of their original mentor. Rev. Patterson. The Jan Hofmeyr School is a very vivid example of the moduce of the artist—in this case almost frightening in its elsom.

Among the exhibits there are a Among the exhibits there are a number of complete, decorative works of art. And here again one can see the difference between the freer treatment of line and atmosphere by some of the schools in contrast with the gloomy atmosphere of others. One exhibit which was much more than decorative was a piece of sculpture called "Jonah" from the Indaleni Arts and Crafts School of Natal.

It was also interesting to see that the best of the pictures were sold; this confirms my personal view that the public, given the choice, and necessarily knowing why it does so, will always choose the better article. ### Dogs or 'Boys'

Once we understand that the whole complicated and oppressive system of race discrimination has been built to enforce the Master, Servant relationship, we shall have no difficulty in seeing the falseness of promises to provide a hational home for Africans or anyone else.

Let me illustrate with an example

My first is taken from a note on My first is taken from a note on sheep-dogs in the Department of Agriculture's Handbook for Farmers. The writer apparently is fond of dogs, and distressed that they are not used and are even looked on with disfavour by farmers. The reason, he says, is that human labour is cheap and plentiful,' so that a dog costs as much as the wages of 'several natives.' 'But the question of labour is about the question of about is daily becoming more serious as the native becomes enlightened, and farmers, who even today find it difficult to 'hire boys,' will sooner or later be forced for economic

or later be forced for economic reasons to use dogs."
The dog-lover has been proved wrong. Farmers use, not dogs, but convicts, supplied to them under Apartheid laws. Farm wages remain unchanged, while farmers profits are higher than ever before.

Using the same techniques, mine Using the same techniques, mine to the control of the co

Using the same techniques, information owners have also managed to peg African wages to what they were in 1890 or thereabouts, when mining first began. Not real wages, mind you, but money wages, which now average about 3s. 1d. per shift on the gold mines—more or less the come wage steep as were naid on the gold mines—more or less the same wage rates as were paid in the industry's infancy. Apartheid enables the coal mine owners to produce

owners to produce coal more cheaply than anywhere else in the world, and more cheaply today in terms of real prices than 40 years

Afrikaner Nationalists, like others of their class, owing their wealth and privileges to the exploitation of underpaid, underfed, badly housed and sickly works, will never voluntarily surrender the source of their super-protections but live in constant fear that the Non-Europeans, like Prometers, will be released from their chains,

### Prometheus Unbound

Prometheus, the creator of civili-Prometheus, the creator of civili-sation in the Greek fable, was said to have angered Zeus (the father of gods and men) by bringing fire from heaven to man. Zeus had him chained to Mount Caucasus, where a vulture preyed upon his liver, which grew again at night, deom-ing him to this torment until re-rested the secret of Zeus's ever-related, becared to Zeus's ever-fected, preferring to suffer rather than preferring to suffer rather than preferring to suffer rather than perpetuate the rule of a ty-

It is a monstrous deceit that Non-European do 'mainly' unskilled work. Fifty years ago, in the same mines that today still produce the world's cheapest coal, Zulu miners operated electrical cutters which, the government mining engineer said, made driving a tram look like unskilled work. It was the pay, not the work, that was and is still today unskilled: '78s. and less for 30 shifts, without paid holidays or sick leave.

Men are doing skilled work at unskilled rates because they have not been organised for effective trade union and political action.

trade union and political action.
Africans, like others, have, however, learned much besides skills.
They have learned, for instance, that Jack is as good as his Master, and that the servant is worthy of and no longer willing to do dogs work for less than the cost of a dog. They are able and willing to organise.

Kattheen, a year younger, is a factory worker, earning £2 12s. a week. Kathleen and Victor give all their earnings to their mother procket more. Shillings a week procket more. The Richards have five other children—two at school, two

insurance benefits were stopped.

The Labour Department does not take into account at all a per-son's qualifications, his aspirations or his wishes," said another trade Women factory workers are seldom offered anything else than domestic work.

For those workers earning up to £15 a month, "suitable" work is defined in the Act as "any work, in-cluding work in agriculture, or as a domestic servant in a private ousehold

"Their experience has shown them that the Labour Department is not at all interested in providing them with 'similar' work, but only offers them the most ill-paid jobs and then disqualifies them from receiving unemployment benfits when

When the United Nations commission on racial discrimination in South Africa declares, therefore, that apartheid is being applied "hesitantly," it is referring to so-called "positive" apartheid. By this is meant the mass transfer of Africans from the towns to the

It is becoming the fashion in It is becoming the tashion in South Africa to say that apartheid "won't work," because the econo-my will not permit it. The business men utter this piece of wisdom contentedly, and then relax in their swivel-chairs.

They are satisfied to let the op-pressive side of apartheid (which is the **only** side of apartheid) con-tinue relentlessly.

The democratic movement in South Africa has never had illu-sions about apartheid. It knows sions about apartheid. If Rhows that the purpose of apartheid is not to divide South Africa into "White areas" where the White man will live his life and "Black areas" where the African will soar to dizzy heights (under White utilion); the purpose is to subjugate the working masses and keep them in perpetual bondage.

Strijdom's Government has never been "hesitant" about this. It has passed fascist laws as quickly as it can draft them, and constructed elaborate machinery to see that these laws are enforced.

The first major fascist law passed by the Nationalists was the Suppression of Communism Act.

### Tin Workers Want Higher Wages

CAPE TOWN.

"Whilst the Wage Board shows concern for the retention of bosses" profits, it shows no concern for the workers' living standards," the South African Tim Workers' Union states in a memorandum objecting to the recent Wage Board recom-mendations for the metal containers and preserved food industries.

Descript too insustries.

Objecting to the proposed new wage rates, the union says the Board's recommendations fall short of its very reasonable requests. "We are convinced after studying the Board's report that the employers are adoing very well out of their plants and can easily afford to pay as much as the union has requested and more."

The union also opposes the intro-duction of sex discrimination into the industry "where none has hither-to existed" and demands that wo-

to existed" and demands that wo-men get equal pay for equal work. The Tin Workers' Union further asks for a 44-hour week (instead of the proposed 46). 3 weeks' annual leave instead of 2; sick leave on full pay for all workers, and not only after 2 years' service.

Regarding incentive rates work, the union states that "any incentive the union states that "any incentive scheme to operate successfully must have the full co-operation and understanding of the worker. The worker must be willing to follow the scheme. We object to the clause recommended as it does not allow for negotiation or discussion on the scheme to be operated," It was followed by the Public Safety and Criminal Law Amend-ment Acts. Fascist rules were emodied in various other Acts

Then the savage process of namings, bannings and banishments began. Shackles were forged for the leaders. The vicious provisions of the 1927 Native Administration Act were invoked.

To conduct this attack on the workers, Swart enlarged his Spe-cial Branch (in the Pretoria telephone directory it is described as phone directory it is described as the Security Branch). He took away their tell-tale motor-cycle combinations and put them in motor cars to make snooping easier. Letter-opening and tele-phone-tapping became a full-time occupation.

It was the start of a reign of police terror and intimidation. Wherever Whites and non-Whites mingled, the detectives mingled, to detectives mingled too. Wherever people met to talk democracy, the detectives listened, Raid followed raid; workers in the cause of freedom are harried and thrown into gool and thrown into gool all, and then released reluctantly.

But all the time the democratic movement grew. Leaders of the African National Congress and South African Indian Congress were put under total bans, and yet a bigger Congress movement. yet a bigger Congress movement, embracing wider sections of the people, grew and flourished. New forms of struggle were launched, based on the solid foundations built by the leaders now banned.
